Liftoff's Annual All Member Meeting




On May 6, Liftoff held its Annual Member Meeting in Orchard Park, at the Orchard Park Country Club. This was the first time the group had been together in person since November 2019. It was a wonderful time for colleagues to meet and reconnect. Director, Rachel Bonsignore kicked off the day with a presentation to discuss Liftoff's evolution since its forming in 2017, review policy victories from 2021 and share plans for the coming year.

Liftoff has evolved into a strong aligned action network with clear strategic priorities. Aligned Action Update: Preschool Special Education and Affordable Child Care



When Liftoff asked over three hundred Western New Yorkers '<u>what will it take for</u> <u>children to be school ready?</u>' parents, providers, pediatricians, and community partners overwhelmingly said two things:

- knowledge of a child's developmental milestones and connections to supports and services; and
- high-quality, affordable, and accessible child care.

This has been, and will continue to be, our strategic focus. By design, Liftoff joins with organizations and leaders advocating for changes in policy and in funding at the State and local levels.

This spring Liftoff advocated for increased support for Early Intervention and Preschool Special Education systems and a handful of other critical legislative priorities, as a member of the <u>Kids Can't Wait Campaign</u>. Several were passed by the Senate and Assembly and are on the way to Governor Hochul's desk!

Liftoff is also a proud partner of the <u>Empire State Child Care Campaign</u> which has seen many policy wins in the past few weeks, including improved child care subsidy assistance for working families and greater efficiency in its administration. <u>Click here to read the ESCCC's full statement</u>.

The stress parents are experiencing has three branches: affording and accessing resources, pandemic disruptions in schools, and mental health impacts of the pandemic."
