## Aligned Action Report: The NYS Budget

This year, Liftoff's budget advocacy centered on three critical areas: increasing reimbursement rates by 11% for bolstering critical compensation for our child care workforce, and expanding the reach of Help Me Grow NYS.

Early Intervention: After years of unchanged reimbursement rates for Early Intervention (EI) services in NYS, we applaud the ( approving a budget that includes a 5% rate increase for in-person EI services. Additionally, starting in April 2025, a 4% rate m services delivered in rural and underserved areas, aiming to address disparities in access across the state. While this may stern higher paying sectors, it falls short of solving the crisis caused by rates that are lower now than they were in 1994. **Read the Can't Wait Campaign** here. <u>Child Care</u>: This budget reduces investment in the childcare workforce, who earn less than 96% of workers in other occupatior existing workforce shortages, affecting program capacity and lengthening waitlists, underscoring the urgent need for fair comp this year's budget is a small but significant subsidy rate increase for providers offering childcare during non-traditional hours an children.
